

















The children who have created this comic, with the help of Miss Middleton, were encouraged to think about the place and time they live in. Their work comes from discussions about life in Withywood - their own particular corner of Bristol - and from thinking about the experiences of their grandparents and great grandparents. As a result many of them made stories reflecting family life; drawing siblings, parents and pets. Others showed local wildlife, such as Declan's vivid account of being stung by bees or Jake's speculative account of Withywood's prehistoric residents.

This comic is the product of 29 extremely creative people all of whom have something to say about their environment.

MAKE YOUR OWN HISTORY COMIC!

- What happens in your story? Where does it take place? Who is it about? How does it start and how does it end?
- People What does the star of your story look like? You'll draw them a lot in your comic, so it helps to work out what they look like at the start.
- 3 Script Write about the pictures that will make up your comic. Who is in each picture? Where are they? What are they saying and doing?
- A Layout Think about the box that each picture will be in. What size and shape will they be?
- Pencilling Draw the pictures in pencil, making sure it is clear what is happening. Remember to leave enough room for the words!
- 6 Lettering Add the speech balloons, thought bubbles, sound effects and captions.
- 7 Inking When you are happy with your drawings go over them in black ink so they stand out more. Don't forget to rub out the pencil lines afterwards.

Now you have your own comic! You could colour it in or get it photocopied for your friends to read. This is just a guide, showing you one way of making comics. It's up to you how you do your next one!
